Lesson #4

Topic: The Ten Commandments

Lesson Plan

Grade Level: 3rd & 4th (Ages 9-10) Lesson Duration: 45-60 minutes

Lesson Objectives:

By the end of the lesson, students will:

- Understand that God gave the Ten Commandments to Moses.
- Study all Ten Commandments and understand their meanings.
- Explain how obeying God's commandments helps you live a holy life.

1. Opening Prayer (5 minutes)

Begin with the Lord's Prayer, asking God to help us follow His commandments.

2. Introduction: What Are the Ten Commandments? (10 minutes)

- Ask: "What are the rules, and why do we have them?"
- Just as families and schools have rules, God provided us with guidelines to help us live in a manner that pleases Him.
- Read **Exodus 20:1-21**, summarizing how God gave the commandments to Moses on Mount Sinai.
- Show an image of **Moses receiving the tablets**.

3. Learning the Ten Commandments (15 minutes)

Introduce the Ten Commandments using language that's easy for kids to understand.

- 1. Love God above all else.
- 2. Do not worship idols.
- 3. Respect God's name.
- 4. Keep the Lord's Day holy.
- 5. Honor your parents.
- 6. Do not hurt others.

- 7. Be faithful in marriage.
- 8. Do not steal.
- 9. Do not lie.
- 10. Do not be jealous of others.

Activity: Write the commandments on the board and have the students repeat them out loud.

4. Why Are the Commandments Important? (10 minutes)

- The commandments teach us how to love **God** (1-4) and how to love **others** (5-10).
- Jesus summarized them with two great commandments:
 - 1. Love God wholeheartedly.
 - 2. Love your neighbor as yourself (Matthew 22:37-40).

Discussion Questions:

- Why do you believe God gave us these commandments?
- Which commandment do you find the hardest to follow?
- How does following these commandments make us better people?

5. Memory Activity: Hand Commandments (10 minutes)

- Use **finger counting** to assist students in memorizing the commandments.
 - 1. One God (1 finger up).
 - 2. No idols (two fingers form an "X").
 - 3. Honor God's name (symbolized by three fingers forming a "W" for "words").
 - 4. Keep the Lord's Day holy (4 fingers like a church steeple).
 - 5. Honor your parents (five fingers—like giving a high five to your parents). 6-10. Use hand gestures to illustrate the rest.

Alternative Activity: Have students participate in a matching game where they pair each commandment with real-life scenarios.

6. Closing Prayer & Take-Home Challenge

- End with a prayer:
 "Lord, help us to follow Your commandments and live a life that pleases You.
 Amen."
- Take-Home Challenge: Have students choose one commandment and explain how they can incorporate it into their daily routines.
